Istanbul's skyline changed dramatically in the years following Constantinople's conquest by the Ottomans. This study day begins by examining Sultan Mehmed II's attitude to the city's Byzantine past and especially to the Haghia Sophia. We will consider his attempts to bring prosperity back to the city and make it a worthy capital of empire; Topkapı Palace and the Grand Bazaar are among the buildings that will be examined in this context. The long and successful reign of Süleyman the Magnificent will be another area of focus since it was a Golden Age for Ottoman Art and Architecture. We will explore the impressive Süleymaniye Mosque, the ubiquitous art of Iznik ceramics, Sultanahmet (known as the Blue Mosque) and some lesser-known treasures. The day will provide an in-depth exploration of how the Ottomans communicated ideas about themselves, their power and their place in the world through their art and architecture.
