The years following the early Renaissance in Europe opened up a world of cultural, artistic and intellectual exchange for the gifted and the curious. The map of Europe at that time was determined by the reach of the Holy Roman Empire and the countries that we know of today as Germany and Italy did not exist as such, but were groups of city states which shared aspects of language and culture. Trade between all parts of the Empire was the norm, allowing for the spread of goods and ideas to flourish. It was into this world that Albrecht Dürer was born. This series of lectures will chart the rise of the precocious youth that was Albrecht Dürer who was born in Nuremberg in the Holy Roman Empire on 21st May 1471.
