Jugon les Lacs, Brittany, France. 6th - 10th June 2022




On arrival in Brittany, our first venue was Jugon-Les-Lacs. The site was very nice, with a water park for adults and kids, and an indoor swimming pool, There were some lovely walks too, which were not far from the town itself, with cycling paths around a large lake with lots of wildlife.

On the first night, in the restaurant, our group were welcomed by the staff. We had a pre-arranged Breton Meal of galettes, crepes and cider. The following day, we had a guided tour with a lovely lady (who's English was excellent), around the lake and into the village of Jugon-Les-Lacs.

We had a walk around the village, and visited a church called Eglise Notre-Dame et Saint-Etienne, which was built at the end of the 12th Century by the monks of Marmoutier, the style was originally Roman, but in between the 14th and 15th Centuries, a Norman bell tower was added. The church had the most amazing stained glass windows, very beautiful, and one of them traces the history of the founding of Jugon.

The church organ was kindly donated from our very own Great Britain!





We had lunch in the village but the group had to be into two. the split restaurants could not accommodate all of together. We went at the same time to two different restaurants, where we all had lovely food, and would definitely go back there again.



The next day, we had an organised coach trip to Dinan, a really lovely town not far from Jugon-Les-Lacs. The town is famous for its cobbled stone streets and half timbered houses, which were beautifully built, and a site to see.

There is also a fourteenth Century castle which overlooks the Rance river and the lower town, built in Medieval times. It was quite surreal, and looked like a film set.



Whilst walking around this enchanting town, we came across a crane type lift up to a third storey window. This is, apparently, the way the townsfolk remove their furniture, (or install it), as the buildings are so high, and quite inaccessible. It was fascinating to watch.

Some people were visiting the bell tower there, but one man felt ill while he was up there, and couldn't walk back down the stairs. He had to have the cherry picker cage sent up with a fireman in it to rescue him, which drew in quite a crowd.

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Everyone enjoyed the trip, especially the excellent 3 course lunch (with wine and coffee) that followed in a local restaurant, Le Longueville.

La Guyonniere, Vendee, France - 10th to 14th June 2022

After a long drive from Jugon les Lacs, (167 miles) we arrived at our second rally site, Village De La Guyonniere, in the Vendee region. We were soon directed to our pitches where we quickly set up camp. This site is large with plenty to do on site and has a Snack bar, Restaurant, Shop, water park and, most importantly, a bar and happy hour each evening with music and entertainment (many of our group could be found here every night). The camp site is owned by a Dutch family, the Father Pierre and his two sons Thys and Piet who have been running the site for 30 years. The first evening we all congregated in the restaurant, where we were greeted by Thys and Piet. They gave us a warm welcome and then proceeded to serve our welcome meal, three courses with wine and coffee. The food was excellent, very tasty, and service was very good.





The following day we took a coach to the vineyard Saint Nicholas where they grow and produce organic biodynamic wine, working with nature. After a talk on how they grow, produce and bottle their wine, we had a guided tour around the vines and wine presses.

Then came the serious business of tasting their wines along with a selection of Hor d'ouevres and Appetizers, after which we were free to buy what ever wine we wanted. I believe we all left having sampled many different wines, a little light headed and having spent quite a few of our precious euros.



Later that evening we all had a get together outside Ray and Carol's motorhome. Several folks were planning a bike ride to the coast the following day, to Bretignolles sur Mer. After much discussion, and looking at the route they would take over several glasses of wine, it was decided by eight of them that they would head out around 10.30 the following morning on, allegedly, a 15-16 mile round trip. Sensibly, I had decided to have a quiet time back at the camp with few glasses of red wine.







Eight intrepid explorers started out; Ray, Carol, Ian, Sharon, Robert, Graham, Heather & Andy, but apparently they came across one or two problems. 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Camping I'lsle Verte, Montsoreau, France, 14th - 22nd June 2022

After leaving our 2nd rally site at La Guyonniere, and the friendly goats, we ventured Northeast for a couple of hours eventually arriving at the delightful village of Montsoreau. It's one of Frances prettiest villages, nestled alongside the mighty Loire. The journey, in convoy with Robert & Bridget was somewhat uneventful, I don't even recall circling any roundabouts more than once!

Camping L'Isle Verte is nestled amongst neatly laid out hedges and trees, which whilst a little compact in places did provide some much-needed shade as the temperatures began to soar throughout the week of our stay. The site sits between the main road joining Montsoreau to Saumur, and the River Loire river and is only a short 10 minutes walk from the village centre.

This is where you find the boulangerie/patisserie (selling range of amazing mouth-watering cakes) and a very well stocked supermarket, described by some as a veritable TARDIS. There's also Boucherie local and strategically positioned bar "Lion D'Or or Golden Lion! - although its opening hours became a bit of a rally joke, but more of that later.




After our arrival we got everything set up and prepared to meet up on the terrace with our fellow ralliers once again. We enjoyed a warm welcome from our host Clément, the owner of the site and the President of the C'est si Bon group. This was followed by a Table Grill, a cook your own barbecue with a great selection of different meats and vegetables. On this occasion it would have been difficult to criticise the chef!





The following day we all went on a walking tour of Montsoreau, learning about the commune's history, its culture and way of life, especially the troglodyte dwellings set into the cliffs around the village. The area has always been wealthy (stone, wine, and fruit). The Chateau, the only one built on the bed of the Loire River was also the first to be built in the Renaissance style in France. It's unique position on the river allowed it to direct traders on the river to pass through its inner channels and collect taxes. This became particularly important after the French Revolution when the local tuffeau stone increased in production due to new industrial techniques.







As we concluded the walk, we were invited to visit the village Boules De Forte Club, once the preserve of men only and a private members club, which we could enter under the invitation of Clément who is a member.

The game, less well known than Petanque, is traditional to Anjou and played on a curved indoor field with odd, shaped boules often in slippers! That said we all had a go with some surprisingly good ends being played, perhaps some had been practising!







Thursday was a free day and the temperature began to soar, topping 40'C on several days (unbeknown to us this was good preparation for the UK temperatures to come!). A few of us found some respite from the heat in the site's swimming pool. Although for the serious swimmers the sight of 20 plus Brits cooling off and having a good old natter probably wasn't quite what they expected!

On Friday morning we went on a coach trip for a guided tour of Chateau Villandry. This is one of the few chateaux that are still furnished and gives a good insight into the luxurious lifestyle of the French aristocracy. After the visit, we had time to visit one of the local restaurants before rejoining the coach.











Saumur, the local town was just a short bus or taxi ride from L'Isle Verte and many of those on the rally enjoyed a trip or two (or three) allowing us to explore this vibrant white town with its majestic Chateau dominating the skyline. When we visited, along with Robert & Bridget, we took a local taxi in and enjoyed a pleasant day exploring the area, initially by hopping on the little train that trundles around the main sights, including the Church of Nantilly and the prestigious Cadre Noir and its Ecole Nationale d' Equitation (National Riding School).

Then, by walking around the Chateau grounds and returning downhill to the town, where we enjoyed a fabulous lunch, with great food & cocktails. We then explored the Church of St Peter in the main square, before taking a slow amble back to the taxi pick up point.



The more energetic amongst us, or to put it another way, the bike riders who had previously managed to not fall off, decided to go on a short 3-mile ride to the Abbaye Royale de Fontevraud. The remains of not just one, but two English Kings (who also ruled this region of France), namely Henry II & Richard the 1st (Lionheart), were held here but it is believed they were probably destroyed during the French Revolution. Given the price to view the empty tombs the intrepid riders decided their money was better spent on a beer or two in the town square.

On Saturday we explored the local Montsoreau market (some went off to Saumur to visit their market) enjoying the experience of trying the local produce and then settling down for a glass of wine or two at the local hostelry. As we enjoyed our drink with friends in the early evening, we were suddenly struck by how fellow drinkers around us were leaving, which is not so strange given its was 7pm. However, then we noticed the furniture being moved inside, then the potted plants and we had visions of one of us being unceremoniously loaded onto the sack trolley being used by the bar staff and dumped onto the pavement outside! Apparently, the Golden Lion goes through this ritual every night and then by 8am on the following day it looks like nothing ever happened, with every item back in its rightful place. When we enquired as to why, the response was crime, with passers by stealing items if left out!! Incredulous for such a quiet little village.

Interspersed between the searingly hot days were some very wet nights with some stunning thunderstorms, with one directly overhead thunderclap literally shaking the motorhome (no comments). The rain did not however dampen our spirits, even when on the Sunday of our stay we all got together and celebrated the 51st wedding anniversary of Graham & Barbara in style with fizz and cake. They did want to do it in 2021 when we should originally have been in France, but COVID got in the way! During the evening, which was hosted by Ray & Carol, we also enjoyed some nice nibbles, more drink, and a hellishly hard music quiz, although I think the difficulty depended on who's team you were in.

As our week drew to a close, we were taken on a pleasant walk very local through the vineyards followed by a visit to a local wine cave. This was a very enjoyable experience as the lovely cool cave was filled with a vast variety of bottles surrounding from the region and beyond, all for us to try and buy, which many of us did. This was followed by lunch outside in the sunshine, of savoury sweet filled pitta and breads washed down with more wine and enjoyed with great company.



















Finally, on our last night we were treated to a hog roast on the terrace, prepared and cooked by Clément. This was enjoyed by all and a fitting end to our week in the Loire; we may also have had a little more wine! We also had a small presentation for Ray and Carol in recognition of all the work they had done in organising the rallies in France.











The following morning Au Revoirs were said, accompanied by complimentary Coffee & Croissant on the bar terrace, as we all prepared to depart for home; albeit with many of us spending some more time in France before eventually heading back to blighty.

There is only one more thing to say and that is a massive 'thank you' to Ray & Carol for co-ordinating such an amazing few weeks, we will certainly be back.
