

was Cahors medieval quarter which has a rich history since Celtic times and it became a large Roman City. We strolled in the sun along the riverbank and onto the old 14th century fortified Valente bridge. 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Rally Camping Chateau le Verdoyer



was a bit doggy, keeping Dave and Alistair busy


as it kept tripping out.

The next day we went by coach to visit the Village of Saint Jean de Cole. Floris's father Richard, who also spoke excellent English was our guide, to show us around

of interest. This is a picturesque and very well-preserved medieval village. It is said to be one of the most beautiful villages in France and I would definitely agree. The architecture of the buildings was fascinating with a beautiful church and a Chateau that is privately owned.



There is an old mill (which has been restored) on the banks of the river as well as an ancient bridge. Photo opportunities abound at every twist and turn in the flower filled narrow streets.



From the Village of Saint Jean de Cole, we arrived at Chateau de Puyguilhem, also called Puyguilhem Castle. Puyguilhem is a delightful Renaissance Chateau lying at the heart of a wooded valley near Brantome in Perigord. We were met by a local guide and with Richard's translation skills, broad knowledge, sense of humour and his detailed explanations contributing to helping us understand how it was built and what life was like in the Chateau and surroundings

during the various ages of its existence. For me it was an absolutely stunning example of a Chateau. Although it had limited furniture, there were chairs, chests, a

four-poster bed, kitchen table, and the most amazing five-hundred-year-old tapestries. When the bed warmer, called a monk (most definitely unlike traditional bed warmers!) was explained, this just made my day.

From Puyguihem we made our way to Caves of Villars. The stalactites and stalagmites were impressive. There was a really good computer-controlled show giving excellent historical perspective on the development to understand the geological

phenomena. The cave tour

showed beautiful formations and cave art and explained their origins. One remarkable feature of note were images of horses and scratch marks from Ice age bears.

After a well-earned rest, Richard provided his "famous Verdoyer picnic" in the recreation area. With help from his granddaughter, we were fed and watered, which was delicious and well received.

The next day we were invited to visit Chateau Le Verdoyer. We were given a tour around the Chateau and its history. There was a staircase that took you to the top of the tower, after being warned about a bee's nest at the top, I was out. But, for others it had to be done. I was told the views were brilliant.

The following day was a rest day, so it only seemed right that the finals of the Boules competition took place. 




FRENCH RALLY 2024

Dates: Fri 7th June to Fri 21st June

This is a 2 site, 14 night Rally to South Eastern France.

Once again we are using C'est si Bon Group



(Approx £1300 and £745 @ 1.15€ = £1)

Site A - Camping du Pont de Bourgogne, Chalon sur Saône, Burgundy

330 miles from Dieppe, 365 miles from Ouistreham/Caen, 400 miles from Calais. 3* site with a new bar/restaurant and shower block on the banks of the River Saône.

This is a stopover site en route to our main rally site, but is in an excellent location just a 10 minute walk from the historic city of Chalon (with it's many restaurants, shops and wine cellars, selling the local Burgundy wines).

Fri 7th to Mon 10th June (3 nights = 200€/Couple & 130€/Single)

Fri - Arrival, Welcome Meal. (Aperitif, regional dish of Bœuf Bourgignon + dessert)

Sat - Guided Visit around historic Chalon with Lunch in a city Restaurant

Sun - Free Day with wine tasting and cheese in the evening

Mon - Depart

Site B - Camping le Coin Tranquille, Les Abrets en Dauphiné, Rhone Alps

115 miles south of Chalon sur Saône.

Immaculate 4* site with indoor & outdoor pools, small shop and a large bar/restaurant with terrace which is popular with locals at weekends. It has a very full and varied menu (e.g. Meat, Fish, Burgers, Pizzas, Frogs Legs, Snails).

The site is 2 miles from the small town of Les Abrets, where you will find shops, supermarkets and petrol stations.

Les Abrets is situated 45 miles east of the city of Lyon, in an area famous for it's rivers, lakes, mountains.

Mon 10th to Fri 21st June (11 nights = 1300€/Couple & 725€/Single)

- **Mon** Arrival. Welcome Drink and presentation of the program at 6 p.m. followed by a 3 course meal in the restaurant with coffee and wine.
- Tues Free Day
- Wed Local walk at 10.00 a.m. with Site Owner, Martine.

 Evening Barbecue Party at 7.30 p.m. Meal in the terrace restaurant with Full wine and coffee included. Live Music all evening from Celine and Thierry Midi.
- **Thur** Meet at 10 a.m. Coach to Aix les Bains for a 5.50 hour cruise on Lake Bourget, Saviere Canal and River Rhone, with lunch on the boat. Stopover at the pretty village of Chanaz. Arrive back at campsite at 6.30 p.m. / 7.00 p.m.

- **Fri** Depart by coach at 8.00 a.m. for a full day in the UNESCO World Heritage city of Lyon the gastronomic capital of France. Guided Tour of the old city followed by a typical lunch in a Bouchon Lyonnaise. Boat trip around the Ile Barbe in the afternoon. Depart at 5.00 p.m.
- Sat Free Day with a get together in the evening at the Rally Marshal's pitch.

Sun - Free Day

Mon - Coach from campsite at 9.30 a.m. to the scenic village of Vongnes in the Bugey region for a wine tasting followed by a picnic organised by Gilles and the campsite staff (includes wine and coffee). Return via scenic route, arriving back to camp at around 6 p.m.

Tues - Free Day

Electric Cars, a Modern Invention?

Did you know that in 1884 the first production standard electric car in the world capable of being reproduced and sold to the public was revealed? It was built in Wolverhampton by Thomas Parker, an English inventor who was responsible for electrifying the London Underground. This was followed in 1888 by the construction of the first real electric car by German engineer Andreas Flocken.

Did you know that by early 1900 1/3 of all vehicles on the road were electric? They started to disappear rapidly around 1920 with the introduction of gasoline and Henry Ford.

Ferdinand Porsche, the founder of the eponymous sports car, produced an electric vehicle called the 'P' in 1898, before creating the world's first hybrid offering, which was powered by both electricity and a combustion engine.

Mercedes-Benz also offered an electric model called the Mercedes Mixte, in 1906. This car was adopted as a taxi in the cities and even became a race car in 1907.
