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






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LPG Gas for your Motorhome what are your options?

At present the choices are between Calor / Flogas or Refillable LPG, so you have to decide what is best for your circumstances, particularly how do you use your motorhome, mainly off grid or using sites with EHU.

Today most of our rallies are on established sites with EHU but as the cost of energy has risen so much over the last couple of years, sites are charging more for this now. Because of this we are now holding more rallies off grid in the summer months for example on rugby clubs, as well as our usual Warners events and this year the Factory visit rally at Driffield. Fine you say I have solar panels; however you can't cook or heat your van with solar unless you have a powerful inverter, a bank of batteries and lots of solar. However solar will power your heater by using gas, if only for a short time on a dull cold day.

When not on EHU you need gas to ensure you have a cold beer in your fridge or a nicely chilled bottle of wine, or warm your toes from the air vent and cook that English breakfast on a beautiful Sunday morning in the Lake District. Then there's days like we had at Driffield, 5 days of cold dull grey skies, where I used at least one 6 kilo Calor gas tank which was £30 at the local garage. Last year, you could not get 6kg cylinders from Calor and if you could they were £36 to £40.

So that got me thinking about a refillable LPG solution and asking around the club I was not alone with about 25% having some form of refillable LPG set-up. Nationally this may be as high as 30% according to the Caravan & Motorhome Club.

So let's look at the pros and cons of fitting refillable LPG tanks to your Motorhome.

Pros:

- No more lifting heavy bottles around or wrapping you knuckles when changing bottles.
- It's easier to travel off-grid without the fear of the supply running out.
- Travelling in Europe becomes more convenient without empty tanks to dispose of. Also you cannot get Calor in Europe but you can get equivalent cylinders of gas, but you will need adaptors. Whereas LPG pumps are plentiful.

Cons:

- For a full new system including two 6 kilo cylinders will set you back around £650
- You have got to find a fuel station that has these LPG pumps and since more electric cars are coming on stream, less garages have these pumps, particularly as Taxis that used LPG are moving over to electric.

So let's have a closer look at the two main refillable systems.



The kits include the following parts to enable a twin cylinder fitment.

- 2 Refillable steel cylinders
- Regulator changeover head
- White or black 70mm filler body with brass bayonet fitting
- Either a 1000mm or 600mm stainless steel or rubber filler hose
- Cylinder to cylinder filler connection
- Two stainless steel or rubber 21.8LHT regulator hoses. (Pigtails)
- LPG Filler mounting bracket:

Note: The filler point body mounts directly to a vehicle exterior panel or skirt.

If you were to go with an option of two 11 kilo tanks this will cost, you between £850 to £900 or more if you had them fitted



One member has their filler in the gas cabinet whereas mine is in the skirt directly below the gas locker.

The Capacities below are for the Gaslow system however the Gas-It system is roughly the same.

- 6kg cylinder
- carries approximately 11.6 litres of LPG at 80% capacity.
- height 465mm to the top of the filler elbow x 246mm diameter
- weight of 8.30kg when empty
- 11kg cylinder
- carries approximately 21 litres of LPG at 80% capacity.
- height 530mm to the top of the filler elbow 302mm diameter
- weight of 12.4kg when empty

If you wish you could fit one 11kg and one 6kg cylinder or if you have a big enough gas locker, two 11 kilos cylinders.

Note:

Gaslow have a single hose that goes from the filler to the first cylinder, then a hose between the two cylinders via a T-junction on the cylinder.

Gas-It have a T-junction that goes to each tank, the T going down to the filler. Both systems can be altered to be same as each other, although which is the best configuration is debatable.

It is important to remember that even when new the date on the cylinder should be no less than a year old, the date is stamped on the tank. Ten years is the norm, but some are fifteen and after this time the tanks have to be pressure tested, which at current prices costs £90 for each tank. If they are over a year old, they have been on display in the shop for too long, although it's unlikely they will tell you so please check. This applies equally to both new and second-hand cylinders.

Also all the connecting pipes are date stamped, with rubber pipes having a life of 5 years. If they are over the habitation check will pick it up and fail them and advise you to change them asap. Again remember to check when buying new hoses as they too could have been on display for 2 years or more, which mean there's only 3 years of use remaining. The metal braided pipes have a 20-year life, but they do cost 2/3 more. When you buy second hand, always check the date, one seller on Facebook wanted £300 for a 11kg cylinder and hose work, when I pressed her for the date stamp around the rim of the cylinder, she sent a photo of the cylinder which expires in 2024.

There are also two other company that supply refillable systems:

Safefill LPG Gas bottles:

This is the refillable LPG cylinder that was designed specifically to be filled on forecourts. Launched in February 2011 at the NEC and caused quite a stir both with the public and the UK LPG industry. Safefill cylinders are 'user owned', not exchange cylinders and you simply top it up with LPG whenever you need to. They are not fixed in your motorhome like Gaslow or Gas-Itso you have to take-off the main hose and fit an adaptor to fill them.



Cost Approximately: £212.99 for a 10-kilo cylinder.

GasBank:

Refillable gas cylinder for LPG storage used for BBQ, camping, cooking, heating at home, on campervans, caravans, motorhomes, boats, for industrial burners and blowtorches or any application where the standard LPG bottle can be used.

The Cylinder is made from lightweight composite material for durability and high protection demands, net weight of a 11KG cylinder is only 5.51KG. Many Caravan owners have these two systems.



Cost Approximately: £214.99 for a Slim 5kg cylinder

So after much deliberation and research I have just fitted a second hand Gaslow system with two 6kg cylinders and stainless-steel hoses, the hoses have a 20-year life and the cylinders a 9-year warranty.

Fitting both cylinders into my gas locker was easy, I took out all the floor holding clips and straps and then I glued hard foam strips where the cylinders were touching the sides of the locker, I also used the same padding underneath each tank. I then repositioned the straps on the side walls of the locker this gave me a little more storage for my EHU cable and gas & water hoses.

Because I wanted the filler point to be in the skirt of the motorhome I had to make a hole in the leakage vent that lets any leakage of gas out to ground level (propane being heavier than air). The one metre stainless steel hose went through this hole with a rubber grommet protecting the hose. I then got a very good friend with a 69mm hole saw to drill the hole in the skirt and fit the filler underneath the van. Two small notches then had to be filed into the hole with 6 screws, keeping it all in place.

I then attached the pigtails to the regulator hoses and to each cylinder and connected the 600mm hose between the two cylinders, finally fitting the filler hose to number one cylinder. I then re-checked all the connections for leaks using a sprayer filled with washing up liquid, alternatively you can use a proper leak detector. Check everything twice.

Trauma regulators are prone to problems due to re-condensed gas extracting plasticisers from the high-pressure rubber hoses so to help avoid this problem switch off the gas whenever possible. If you are going to fit a system yourself or even just on your existing bottle system always have the regulator above the cylinders and make sure that any hoses haven't got a dip in them so that the liquid gas don't congeal and re-condense over a period time and cause the filters in the regulator to block up, this is more important if you have rubber hoses.

My first outing with the system was at a Warners show at Peterborough, so beforehand I topped up the cylinders at Morrisons in St Ives. I only had to put in 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ litres at a cost of 79.9p a litre, as the tanks came with $\frac{1}{2}$ tanks full, worth £15! Many Morrison's supermarkets have LPG pumps, as well as some independent garages.

At Peterborough over the 5 days using the fridge, cooking & using the external BBQ point. I used 9½ litres of LPG worth £7.60, so it was a saving of approximately £18 vs my previous Calor system, so far so good.


The Dragon boat festival is an annual event and it certainly brought in the crowds as the docks were packed. Teams of
