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Foxtail Holiday Park

Chirk

12th - 19th February 2025

We set out for Chirk on the 11th taking a night stop at Chapel Lane CAMC site on the way north. A convenient site not too far off the M42 South and as it turned out, next to a transport museum. Unfortunately, it was still their closed season, but I am sure we will be visiting again when it is open!

We set off the following morning for Chirk where, on arrival at Foxtails, we were warmly welcomed by the site staff in reception and were provided with our pitch number and further site information. Driving round to our pitch we could see that the site was relatively small but with good size pitches and well-spaced out. Our

rally marshals Heather and Andy quickly came across to

welcome us and invited us to the welcome gathering

later in the afternoon.

Late last year we acquired a rear storage box to go on the bike rack. This has made a great difference to setting up, as we no longer have to clear the van floor of 'stuff' before we can make it a home. In no time at all we were sat having our lunch, though unfortunately, too early in the year to sit outside.

The site is conveniently located to a small retail area, Dobbies, with a café and a small Waitrose located within it, across the road from a pub/restaurant and a bus



stop just by the entrance. Well placed for continuing on from the welcome meeting in the pub later. Heather brought one of her fun quizzes with her, which seemed to produce more questions than answers but finally being won by Ray and Carol. I think we overstayed our welcome a little bit as we were gently reminded that last orders had been called sometime before.

Criccieth, Portmadoc and Betws-Y Coed were also

Friday evening saw the group split between the pub for a meal or the clubhouse for a drink. The beer was better in the clubhouse according to those who know. The diners in the pub, found service was a bit of a problem, which did not bode well for Sunday lunch. Everyone did get a meal eventually, but it may not have been what they ordered.

The weather let us down a bit on Saturday, our trip to Bala and the lake was shrouded in low cloud and light rain so we spent our time wandering around an old chapel, housing antiques

and a coffee shop. We will have to look forward to revisiting, preferably when the train is running. The evening began well with the visit by the local fish and chip van, all fish being cooked on order. We later joined some members of the group in the clubhouse in the evening.

We were kindly offered the shelter of the clubhouse for the rally raffle and coffee morning on Sunday. I think that all motorhomes had at least one win and, in the process, made f £55 for club funds. Most of us met up later to test the service in the pub again. They faired a bit better with the timings and we did get what we ordered for main course. Desserts didn't do so well as follow up service was sadly lacking. A few of us returned to clubhouse in the evening.

Monday morning dawned with the promise of Bacon Baps provided by Ann Jones to raise money for a Prostate Cancer charity in memory of Anthony Steward. Nick



and I shot off to the bakery in Chirk, to collect the pre-ordered baps. Arriving at the bakery just before the 8.30am opening, baps were collected and delivered back to site not much later. Nick had noticed that there was a vehicle missing when he went out for his morning paper which by our return from the bakery had begun to cause some concern amongst the early risers of the group. Following a phone call by Andy we were to learn that one of the group was at that point on their way by blue light to the hospital at Rhyl, after an early morning drive to the local A&E. At which point their partner arrived back on site. Their distress was obvious, but members instantly provided care and support. Vol-

unteers stepped forward to take them to the hospital where their partner was being



transferred too as they were ready. Meanwhile we were being provided with our cooked bacon baps for breakfast. Before the group went their separate ways for the day, we learned that our hospitalised member was being well looked after and on their way to recovery, which was great news. Members of the group put plans in place to support the partner on their return from visiting time.

Nick and I went back to a place we had driven through on our way to Bala, Corwen. This turned out to be one of the stops on the steam railway from Llangollen. As no trains were running it was rather quiet but had some interesting buildings and we found another antiques and collectors warehouse to browse round, a coffee shop and an interesting candle making shop which included a variety of hobby products too.

We were looking forward to our afternoon tea on Tuesday at the adjacent garden center. We took ourselves off towards Wrexham once we knew arrangements had been made for visiting time transport to the hoal. We spent a couple of hours exploring the outskirts of Wrexham where Nick's GGG grandfather was born and brought up. We found Wern where he was baptised but the chapel we saw was made of corrugated iron so later than the 1820s. There was the remains of an extensive lead mine and an old mill. We made sure that we were back for our afternoon tea, which we all enjoyed and most of us took a food box with sufficient for a tea on a later day. We provided transport for the evening visit to the hospital.

Prior to our departure the following morning we

learned that our fellow rallier was well enough to leave the hospital later that day and would return to the site via hospital taxi service. It was nice that we could leave to visit our son, knowing that they were so much better. Since our return home we are pleased to say that they returned home later in the week and are well on their way to a full recovery.





It really was great to see how everybody responded to the hospitalisation of one of the group and pulled together, making life as easy as possible for their partner. The site also assisted in providing pitch for longer than originally booked. This backed up the level of welcome, that as a rally, we had received from arrival.

Pinecones Caravan & Camping Park

12th - 19th March



The campsite boasts ensuite facilities with piped music, Heated Picnic Huts, Sky Sports Cinema and Bens Bar. The latter being very cosy, able to accommodate us all, but sadly, last call was 8.30 pm. However, we did have many of our own, enjoyable and well-attended meetings in the fresh Norfolk air. With plenty of delicious food, fabulous cakes and wine. Also, a fish and chip delivery.



There are many walks which are also suitable for cycling. A couple of our gents did venture out in this mode. Well done, Andy for managing to accomplish some miles towards your charity fundraising. The rest of us, by shank's pony hot hot-footing it to nearby Dersingham village along a path well frequented with Muntjac who were oblivious to us mere humans.



Obviously, we were on an errand, either to the bus stops or the Royal Feathers Hotel said to be frequented by the Sandringhamites when in residence. Purchased in 1882 by the Sandringham estate for King Edward V11, Prince of Wales, hence the name of the pub. He apparently lived there. The Feathers now boasts a GIN selection of some 340 varieties. So, one assumes 12 days of the year are 'DRY GIN'. This was the rally's Sunday Lunch venue, very plush surroundings and a huge meal happily, or should we say regally, partaken where the Lords of the realm eat and drink.

Further up the road and through the pine woods, you come to the heart of the estate. Sadly, the house was closed, but the shop and café were open and had excellent fare and provisions available. Certainly, we

will return.

Nearby was Hunstanton, a charming Victorian seaside town full of beautiful buildings.

Further along the coast is Tichwell RSPB. Well worth a visit with several lagoons, some freshwater and some salt marsh to attract the different kinds of birds. These lagoons are constantly being filled then drained according to the needs of the next expected influx of birds and ducks galore. Exciting to see how the birds and ducks scatter and form fascinating 'murmurs' in the air when a Marsh Harrier appears. Very helpful volunteers at hand to educate you in the rudiments of our feathered

friends. So much so, we almost didn't make the sand dunes and glorious coast line of sandy beaches.



Eventually onward to Wells. A wonderful Quayside fishing village. Ancient Staithe Street has a shoe shop with its original frontage right at the back of the shop, an Excellent Tourist Information center and an exhibition of amazing arts and the Good Old Days in Wellsnext-the-Sea

From Pinecones going west towards Kings Lynne is Wolferton. The beautiful and immaculately preserved village where Queen Victoria's Station is at the termination of her own private railway line. It is extremely

Grand, imposing and very large. The road around the village is like a figure of eight, one-way system, so that copious amounts of horse and carriages could travel uneventfully to and from Royal Sandringham. The House next to the old church is where Prince Philip used to stay, presumably for a quiet time away from the other Royals. It also backs onto the royal Stables and paddocks. Visiting here is a MUST

King's Lynn medieval town on the River Great Ouse. Founded before the $11^{\rm th}$ century in the Doomsday Book, boasting a leaning tower, a unique Victorian Park, a long and interesting port history full of royal patronage

Wherever we went, someone from the rally was there or traveling on the same bus. A very social rally culminating in an excellent farewell afternoon tea and raffle in which Sue & Bob had their ticket numbers pulled from the 'hat' some 5 times,
