site craft village. The pitches were spacious, water and Elsan point were provided at the top end of the site. Dogs were welcomed with endless country walks to delight any pooches with their human friends. The Deli shop is certainly worth a visit. To get about you do need your own transport.

AGM RALLY, West Midlands Showground, Shrewsbury 10th - 17th September 2024

BATTLEFIELD CHURCH VISIT

Whilst attending the Club Rally at Shrewsbury in September Esther, myself and Betram (SMOC Bear) came across the church of St Mary Magdalene in the village of Battlefield which, as the name suggests, is dedicated to Jesus' companion Mary Magdalene.



The church was built in 1406 on the site of the Battle of Shrewsbury, which was fought on 21st july 1403 and waged between an army led by the Lancastrian KingHenry IV and a rebel arm led by Henry "Harry" Hotspur Percy from Nrthumberland. The battle, the first in which English archers fought each other on English soil, reaffirmed the effectiveness of the longbow and ended with the death of Henry Percy and his challenge to the King of England.

The church was originally intended

as a chantry, which is a place of commemoration for those killed in the fighting. It is believed to have been built over a mass burial pit which is thought to have around 600 bodies buried it. It was originally a collegiate church staffed small community of chaplains whose duty was to perform a daily liturgy for the dead. Roger Ive, the local parish priest, is generally regarded as the founder, although the church received considerable



support and endowment from Henry IV in thanks for his Victory.

After the dissolution of the college and chantry in 1548, the building was used as the local parish church. Due to the small congregation the building suffered from serious decay with several attempts at rebuilding from the mid-18th century.

Today although it is a redundant Anglican church a liturgy is held twice a week for the dead of the 1403 battle. This short service is open to the public.



The church is recorded in the National Heritage List for England as a designated Grade II* listed building, and is under the care of the Churches Conservation Trust

After the dissolution of the college and chantry in 1548, the building was used as the local parish church. Due to the small congregation the building

suffered from serious decay with several attempts at rebuilding from the mid-18th century. A restoration in Victorian times was controversial in detail, although many original features remain.

During the evening, we celebrated two birthdays Ann had brought along delicious cakes to share with everyone on her birthday. We then surprised Bill with a card and cake to Celebrated his 90th birthday. It was lovely catching up with Bill and Phylis and celebrating his 90th birthday. Bill has been an active committee member of SMOC for many years and always the life and soul of many a rally, wishing them both many more years of happy travels.

On the Sunday a large group of us went for a very enjoyable lunch at the Bird in Hand pub which was about half a mile away.

The 2023 French Rally presented a few problems, as the banking system keeps making changes that requires a little patience, and the French never make things easy!

Web-Collect

When an order is placed by a member using one name and payment made by someone using a different name it can be quite a challenge to work out what the payment covers. An email would be useful in those circumstances.

I would ask members to use the event Order ID. rather than the Web-Collect "unique number" as their Reference when making BACS payments. It does make my job a lot easier. If a Bank Payment is made covering more than one activity, please let me know by email as it can be quite time consuming trying to work out what the payment is actually for.

Go-Cardless was briefly trialled but shelved for now as it was confusing and would be too costly to use as our main payment tool.

The Accounts were Audited by Carol Collinson, and everything was deemed to be satisfactory.

We have approx. 167 Members and rising slowly.

15 New Members joined us at the Peterborough Show 2023 from the April Promotion, out of them, 11 Members have not renewed or paid in May, all from April 2023 members who signed up at Peterborough.

3 reminder letters went out to them, each stating their membership is overdue, the last letter stating their details will be removed and now have been removed on 1st September, I have not had a single reply from 10 of them, even though I asked all of them to reply,

3 members has cancelled their membership and did let us know. We had 15 members join us at Newbury on Janes sales drive, of which 6 of those joined Jane & Anthony for a newbie rally at Lime Tree Caravan Park, Warwickshire. I believe 2 or 3 are at this rally.

Rally Secretary's Report:

Since last year's AGM we have had 15 rallies with an average of 14 Motorhomes at each rally (15) We have once again explored parts of the UK & France, as far North as Bakewell, as far West as Cardiff and as far South & East as Isère. In total members have booked a total of 1,213 nights (1,108) since the last AGM. In this current year i.e. 2024 we have had a total of 210 individual bookings from 69 (61) members, representing 38% (35% - 2022/23) of our membership. Of these 2024 ralliers, 26 (15) were first timers with 9 (6) of these coming back for more. We are certainly seeing a different mix of ralliers now.

Of the 69 members (61 - 2022/23) who rallied in 2024 a total of 24 came for 4 or more and this group made up 78% (69%) of our rally bookings this year. So, a big thanks to all those members who rallied with us because without you our rally season wouldn't fly.

Bookings and payments for rallies are now exclusively conducted via the "Members Portal" with 207 online bookings/BACS payments made and just 3 paper bookings/cheque payments (2 members only)

Last year's rally season closed out with rallies in Cardiff, followed by a very enjoyable and well-attended Christmas rally at Milestone Caravan Park, who stepped up at the last moment when our original site announced they had been bought by the Caravan & Camping Club and the site was therefore closing for refurbishment.

This year started with a great rally at Woodland Waters (I think Woody's Bar must get the vote for this year's best Fish & Chips) followed by rallies in Charmouth, Cromer (we will get good weather in East Anglia one day) and then Bath. In June several club members had a terrific time in France and a massive thanks must go to Ray & Carol for organising and marshaling this trip. Also in June, we had a first, a Newcomers Rally, which brought together some existing club members who had never rallied before with some who had yet to sign up but were invited to try out the club. This event organised by Jane Steward was a resounding success with 7 newcomers enjoying a weekend on the Leicestershire / Warwickshire border and already 5 have booked to come on other rallies.

Since the French trip, we have also visited Salisbury, where we enjoyed this great little city, had fine weather and enjoyed the club's 35th-anniversary celebrations, the only pity being that more members couldn't join us. This was followed by Bakewell, where again members had a great time and the ever-popular Malvern Show.

The only real downsides this year have been the Newbury Show and the Cardiff Vintage for Victory Festival.

At Newbury, we failed to meet the numbers to be an official rally, although that didn't stop an intrepid few, who met at the services and all managed to be pitched together, albeit in general camping. We did, however, still run a recruitment stand and that was very successful due to the efforts of Jane & Anthony and her band of volunteers.

The Vintage for Victory Festival was unfortunately a big disappointment with only 3 units booked for the weekend.

Following on from this rally, we have the Lincoln show, which despite a slow start finished up with 16 booked for the weekend. Then we have Southport, there are still places remaining, followed by our Christmas rally at Thornton's Holt, Slimbridge and a first to my knowledge, a New Year rally, which is now full I'm afraid.

So now looking to the 2025 program we once again will try to move around the UK and overseas as much as we can. Unfortunately, prices continue to rise and the days of getting sites

for sub £25 are rare, but we do try to make sure that we gain discounts on the usual site rates. Hopefully, you will agree that we have a varied program in terms of geography and type of site/venue, and we look forward to seeing you at those rallies.

The overseas rally is in the Republic of Ireland, and we still have one place left. If you want any further details, please speak to Heather or me. Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to say a massive thank-you to those members who have volunteered to marshalrallies over the last 12 months, without you, one of the core reasons for our club's being (our rallies) would not be possible. So, it remains just to say we "Need You!" for 2025, and any other members who would like to give it a try, it really is great fun! So, if you want to have a go or even co-host one, please, please, please let me know.

Rally Musings, Southport Rally - Oct 2024

It was our first time at Southport, so not sure what to expect from the area. The weather had been pretty wet, so the ground was somewhat damp. We, therefore, parked close to the roadway, so we had less chance of sinking in the mud. There were lots of places to visit in Southport, Lord Street, which is a mile long and a Victorian boulevard with lovely gardens and lots of shops to visit. Thornbrook Barn Caravan Site
